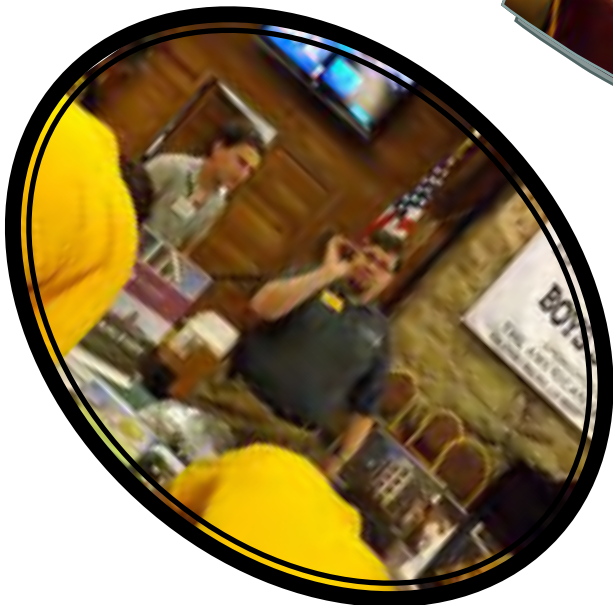

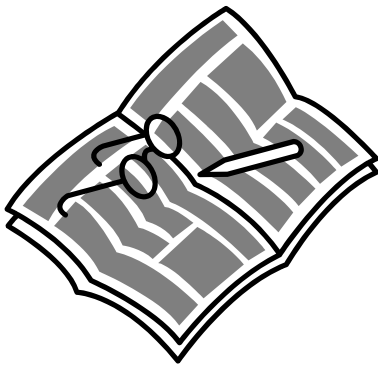
# Honest James

## James Aubrey Stewart

CHARLESTON, W.Va. -- On Dec. 7, 1944, Sgt. James Aubrey Stewart wrote a letter to family and friends in the tight-knit Mineral County town of Piedmont, sending Christmas wishes from the mud and cold of Belgium.

"I suppose everyone there is getting ready for Christmas," Stewart, 37, wrote his father. "Well, all I can say, hope you all have a nice one. Wish I could be with you again this year."

Aubrey Stewart, a sergeant with the U.S. Army's 333rd Field Artillery Battalion, would not make it home for Christmas. Ten days later, German soldiers crushed his skull with a rifle butt and left his body with the bodies of 10 other black soldiers. All were tortured and murdered by the German army and left in a Belgian ditch.

Aubrey Stewart didn't have to join the Army. A renowned left-handed pitcher for his hometown baseball team, Stewart volunteered to join a segregated military in which many white officers didn't believe black men belonged.

Stewart was assigned to the 333rd Field Artillery Battalion, an all-black unit sent to Europe following the June 6, 1944 invasion of Normandy and stationed in Belgium. The unit's performance was exemplary, but when Hitler sprang his surprise counterattack on Dec. 16 in what became known as the Battle of the Bulge, Stewart and his unit found themselves 11 miles behind enemy lines.

Outnumbered and overrun, Stewart and 10 of his fellow artillerymen made their way to a Belgian village called Wereth, where a farmer named Mathias Langer hid them in a barn on the outskirts of town. Also in the barn, according to local legend, were several German deserters.

A neighbor sympathetic to the Germans found out about the men and told authorities. Early on Dec. 17, Stewart and the other 10 artillery soldiers surrendered.

Kip Price, who grew up with Stewart's family, said the black soldiers could have told the Germans about the hidden deserters. They could have revealed that Langer had put them up in the barn. But they didn't.

The Germans tortured the 11 men to get them to talk, but no one did. They were beaten with rifle butts, bayoneted and shot, then left in a ditch. Army investigators later found the men had been mutilated; several had their faces slashed, and one man's finger was nearly cut from his hand.

More than 50 years later, Langer's daughter Maria told an American television reporter that the soldiers' silence saved the lives of the family, and possibly the rest of the town.

"[The Germans] could have killed us," said Maria Langer, who was 17 when the men were killed. "They could have done it."

In Belgium, the artillery soldiers became known as the Wereth 11, and are regarded as heroes. Members of Langer's family erected a monument for the fallen men, and tended Stewart's grave. Rick Rhodes, one of Stewart's surviving nephews, went to Belgium and met with the family.

But in the United States, the fate of the 11 men from the 333rd Field Artillery Battalion remained obscure for more than 50 years.

In January 1945, Stewart's parents received a curt and businesslike letter from the War Department confirming that Stewart was missing in action. Not long after they were told he had been killed.

But no one in the Stewart family was told how Stewart and the other 10 soldiers died. Though Army researchers confirmed the men had been massacred and mutilated, officials did not recommend the incident for follow up.

Meanwhile, the massacre of 84 white troops near a town called Malmedy on the same day the Wereth 11 were killed was actively pursued, and the Germans responsible prosecuted for war crimes.

"So many things are swept under the carpet, but it's an important fact that everybody knows what happened," said Harry Stewart Jr., a great-nephew of Aubrey Stewart who is now living in Charleston.

Harry Stewart said the military apparently didn't care about the fate of 11 black soldiers left in the mud and snow.

"The importance wasn't there," he said. "It wasn't relevant to the government at the time, or to the individuals that were able to make the decisions."

Aubrey Stewart's family didn't learn of his fate until 1996, when a television reporter working on a story about the massacre came to Piedmont and talked to Charles Stewart, one of Aubrey Stewart's nephews. Charles Stewart showed a videotape of the article to neighbors Bill and Kip Price.

"Bill had tears in his eyes," recalled T.J. Coleman, a family friend who wrote a book about Aubrey Stewart and the massacre of the Wereth 11. Friends urged Charles Stewart to tell Aubrey's story wherever he could, but Charles Stewart died before he could fulfill the mission.

Coleman, an Air Force veteran, decided to take on the task.

"It became my calling," Coleman said. "God gave me the vision to honor Mr. Aubrey and all the other soldiers."

Coleman wrote a book about Stewart and founded the Aubrey Stewart Project to spread the word about what happened in 1944. The group hopes to restore Stewart's childhood home and set up a museum in town.

But Coleman also wants what happened to Stewart and the other Wereth victims to bring people together, not tear them apart. He said the Langers didn't care that Aubrey Stewart was black.

"There's been enough hate on all sides," Coleman said. "Let us celebrate our membership in but one race, the human race."

On July 18, the town of Piedmont celebrated its first Unity Day, a manifestation of Coleman's vision that something good come out of the deaths of the Wereth 11. Coleman hopes to make the event a national holiday.

"These men were tortured, they were killed, but they never told the Germans that this family helped them.

"We want their families to know what happened to them. We want people to know they had heroes in their families."

I would like to begin by saying that I had an absolute blast during that week long program, learning not only a lot about the democracy that we live in, but a lot about myself. I am forever grateful for the American Legion for enabling me to have that opportunity. I am furthermore grateful for you and the two other counselors of Monroe Cottage for your professionalism and dedication to us and ensuring that we were safe, productive, and had a good time. I can say with certainty that Mountaineer Boys State is one of the few events that I will always remember from my high school years as having the biggest impact on my development as a person, and for that I cannot thank you enough.

As I said in the preceding paragraph, Mountaineer Boys State taught me a lot about myself. This realization has allowed me to begin the process of change in how I interact with others, and steering me in a direction to be the person that I want to be.
